#### WATER QUALITY

You may have noticed that our field staff were out collecting service line and residential plumbing information in your neighborhood. This was part of a nationwide effort led by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to ensure that people have safe drinking water by ruling out the presence of lead pipes. The U.S. EPA is expected to adopt the Lead and Copper Rule Revisions on 10/16/24 which contain provisions requiring water utilities to submit an inventory of service line and plumbing materials for all service connections.

The CSD finalized the inventory in early October and found that there were no lead pipes in Hidden Valley Lake.

## Did you know that there is such a thing as a water year?

To encompass the full water cycle, the water year runs from October 1 though September 30 in the Northern Hemisphere. In the cycle, precipitation and snowfall typically occur toward the end of the calendar year and then water drains from the watershed in the following spring or summer.

ADVANCED METERING INFRASTRUCTURE (AMI) —SAVE WATER, PAY LESS!

Staff continues to replace aged water meters with modern ones throughout the community. These new meters contain technology that allows customers to track water usage, receive alerts, and identify possible leaks.

HOW DO I KNOW IF I HAVE A SMART METER?

You have a smart meter if your account number begins with 01, 02, 03, 04, 05, 06, 07, 08, 09, 10, 11, 12, or 13. We are currently installing meters for account numbers beginning with 14. Accounts beginning with 15 all the way to 21 will be installed next in numerical order. A yellow courtesy notice will be left on your property when your smart meter is installed.

# PROJECT UPDATES

#### LOCAL HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN

In 2020 the District adopted its first Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP) which outlined the mitigation opportunities for threats against water and wastewater infrastructure in Hidden Valley Lake. The Plan was crucial in unlocking access to federal and state funding opportunities for projects. Since the Plan's adoption, the District has received funding for four major projects on tank replacements, backup power acquisition, water mainline replacements, and vegetation removal.

The District is in the Mitigation Strategy phase of the plan update. During this time, potential mitigation activities for hazards are identified ans listed as possible future projects.

The District will hold its final set of meetings in January at 19400 Hartmann Rd, Hidden Valley Lake, CA 95467:

- Final Public Meeting January 15, 2025 (5:30PM-7:00PM)
- Final Hazard Mitigation Planning Committee Meeting January 16, 2025 (9:00AM-12:00PM)

#### WATER STORAGE RELIABILITY

A brand-new tank has been constructed and is fully operational! The tank is located on Eagle Rock Road and replaced an aged redwood water tank. Preparations are underway to construct the next tank which will be adjacent to this one.

Replacing the sole redwood tank with two larger ones allows us to provide more water for the increased population and fire flow demand. The original redwood tank was outdated and the community quickly outgrew it as more homes were built. Acquiring the new tanks is a major milestone in ensuring the CSD can continue to provide reliable water services.

As work continues, please be aware of the increase in activity in the area. Be sure to abide by all traffic signs and flaggers for everyone's safety.
